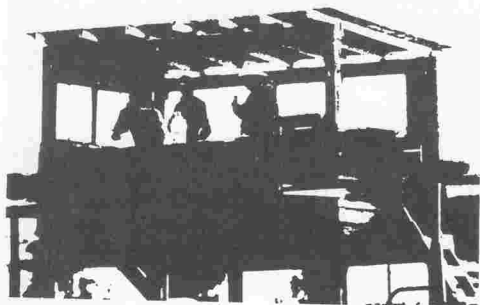

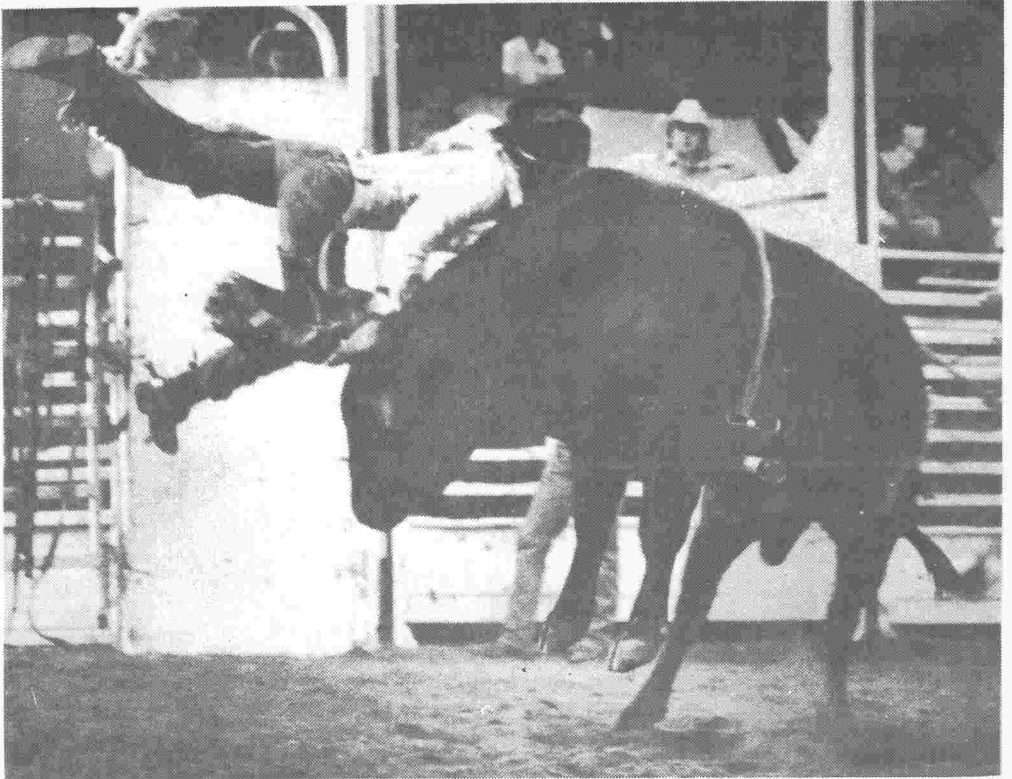
Former NRA Member, Leo Gee, Passes Away

1985 YE Rodeo Pays Off \$52,000

With a total payoff nearing \$52,000 the annual Yellowstone Exhibition in Billings was a resounding success with 459 contestants entered. Cool rains fell during the week, sending folks indoors to the Yellowstone METRA, and making the fair "THE" place to be.

Two go-arounds in the rough stock events and day money in the timed events produced a lucrative payday for winners, especially with \$1350 in added money and \$75 entry fees.

Carpenter Says He's 'Lucky'

Richard Carpenter will admit to being a little lucky but he also has a few tricks up his sleeve.

The Kalispell cowboy entered the Yellowstone Exhibition rodeo leading the Northern Rodeo Association all-around standings.

"I seem to be drawing good. Good luck, I guess," Carpenter said of his 1985 success that

has already seen him go past his 1985 total winnings.

Carpenter, 28, won just over \$5,000 a year ago but has pocketed \$5,665 entering the richest NRA rodeo of the season. He is also the team roping and steer wrestling leader.

"It just means the cattle are breaking right down the middle, not running real strong or real weak," Carpenter said. "They just don't have any tricks, you don't have to set any traps for them."

But Carpenter wouldn't be winning if he wasn't setting a few good traps.

"If they have a particular thing they do, like run left or right, you take a shortcut and try to beat them to the punch," he explained.

Carpenter has been roping for a number of years on the family ranch, where his dad runs Rocky Mountain Rodeo Company. He got serious his senior year in high school when he was one of the few members of the Flathead High School rodeo team. Of course, having rodeo stock available for practice all year around helped Carpenter.

"We start new stock in the winter and it helps quite a bit. There's always steers and calves around, always stock to practice on."

He shied away from the riding events because he always used a rope for the ranch chores, which has helped his team roping.

"I've spent more time team roping than anything else," he said and admitted he was a little surprised to see his name at the top of the steer wrestling standings.

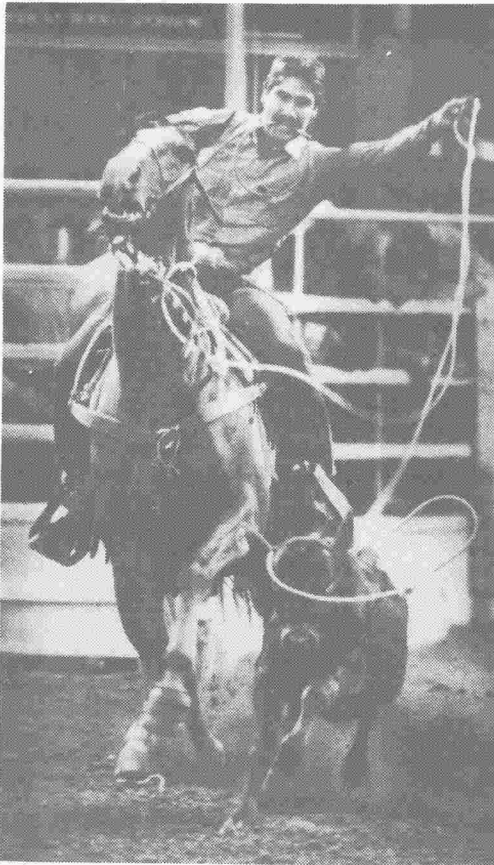
"The competition is pretty keen in the NRA, there are a lot of good bull doggers and team ropers."

He credits former roping partner Danny Cross with his success in steer wrestling, mainly because he uses Cross' horse Kermit, last year's NRA doggin' horse of the year.

"He only lets a couple of guys on him. In my opinion he's the best horse out there right now."

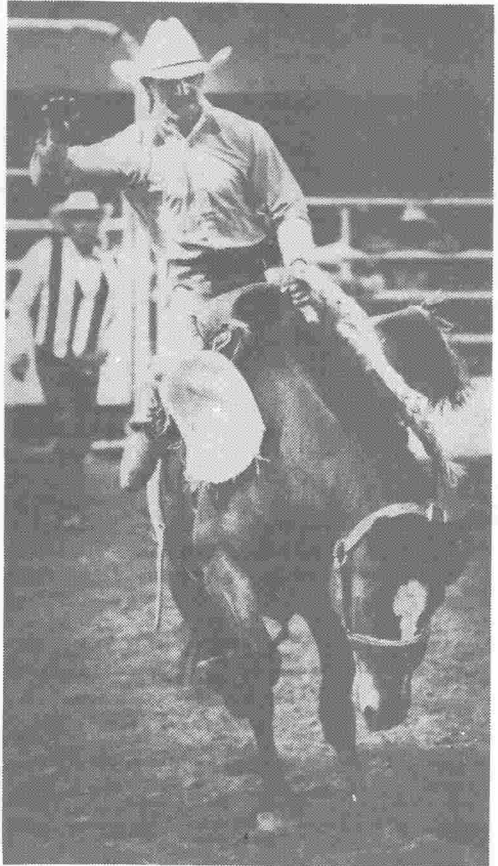
Carpenter uses his horse, Okie, for team roping and borrows one for calf roping, an event he isn't having quite the same success in.

"I'd like to think I'm all right but I don't win very much."

Wollenberg Climbs Back

John Wollenberg got on a new bull Tuesday afternoon and didn't know what it would do. But that's okay, Wollenberg wasn't real sure what he would do.

Wollenberg was the 1980 Northern Rodeo Association bull riding champion but from there his cowboy days were numbered.

"I went in 1981. I got three-quarters of the way through and just quit," he said.

In the past four years he has ridden five bulls and Tuesday's 74 aboard Hippie at the Yellowstone Exhibition in Metra was his first ride in a year. That score was the second best of the afternoon behind the 75 turned in by Brett Todd, of Big Timber, the collegiate national champion.

Wollenberg's ride put him in third overall in the first go-around until Helena cowboy Skeeter Norhahl rode hard spinner Crackerback to an 81 Tuesday night. Stuart Schall, of Arlee, had a 75 on White Lightning during the same show. Monday night Bill Ward of Whitehorse, S.D., had a 77.

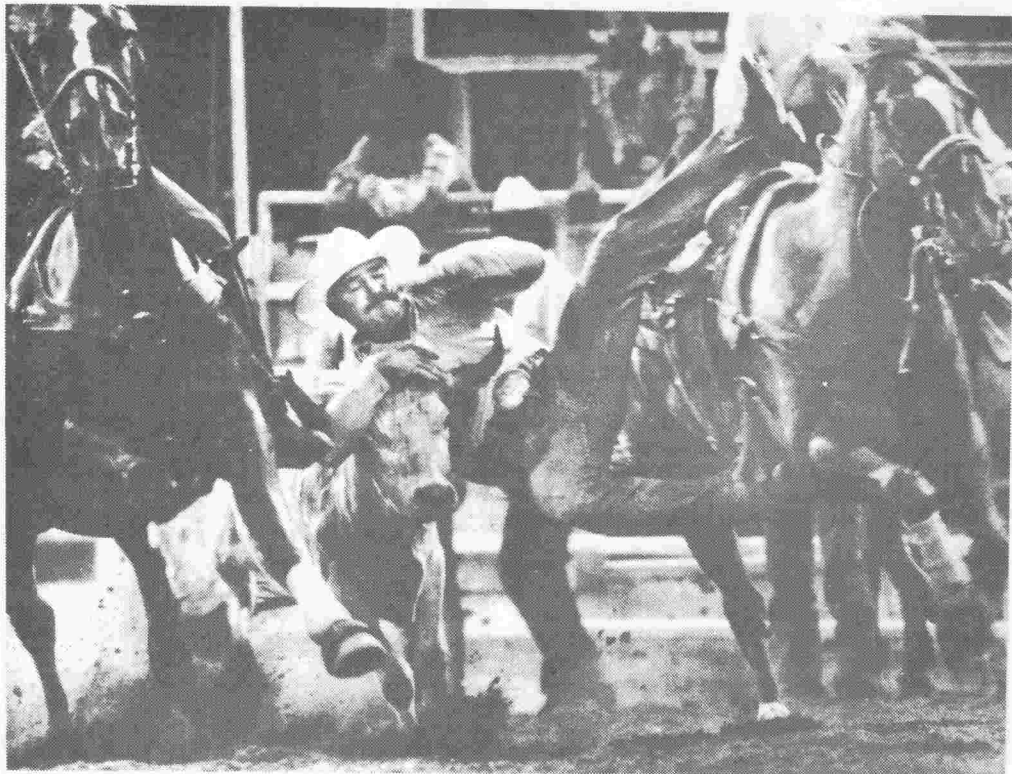
"Nobody seemed to know what he (the bull) would do," Wollenberg, a Billings West High School graduate said. "He bailed out pretty high. He had two jumps and then turned back to the left. It's hard to tell how hard he bucked because I haven't been on anything for so long. I felt a little sloppy."

Still, he was pleased with his 74.

"It's about right. If I had been on a few more before I could have looked a little better. Not much, but a few points. These judges (Duane Lenning and Butch Bratsky) have been around, they're good judges. I was lucky. If he was any bigger or stronger, it might have been a different story."

With a good mark on record and another ride coming up Thursday in the second go-around, Wollenberg, 27, who works on Eaton's ranch outside Wolf, Wyo., was wondering about his decision to quit.

"I don't know why, I still wonder myself," he admitted. "I think I started to get scared of them a little bit. In 1981 I got hurt quite a bit. Nothing serious, more nagging, and finally I just gave it up."

"I miss a lot of the people I traveled with and the guys I see at rodeos. They're fun people to be around."

In 1982 he got on two bulls and got on two last year. With his latest ride, he is five-for-five since his "retirement."

"I just started feeling good again. It all depends on my mental attitude. Physically I think I'm in better shape than I was in 1981. I do a lot of horseback riding and I think it helps if you get the feel of an animal beneath you. That's mostly why I hit this one, to see what happens. I might change my attitude tomorrow. I have another one Thursday and I'll see how it goes."



Rooster Had Reason To Crow at YE Rodeo

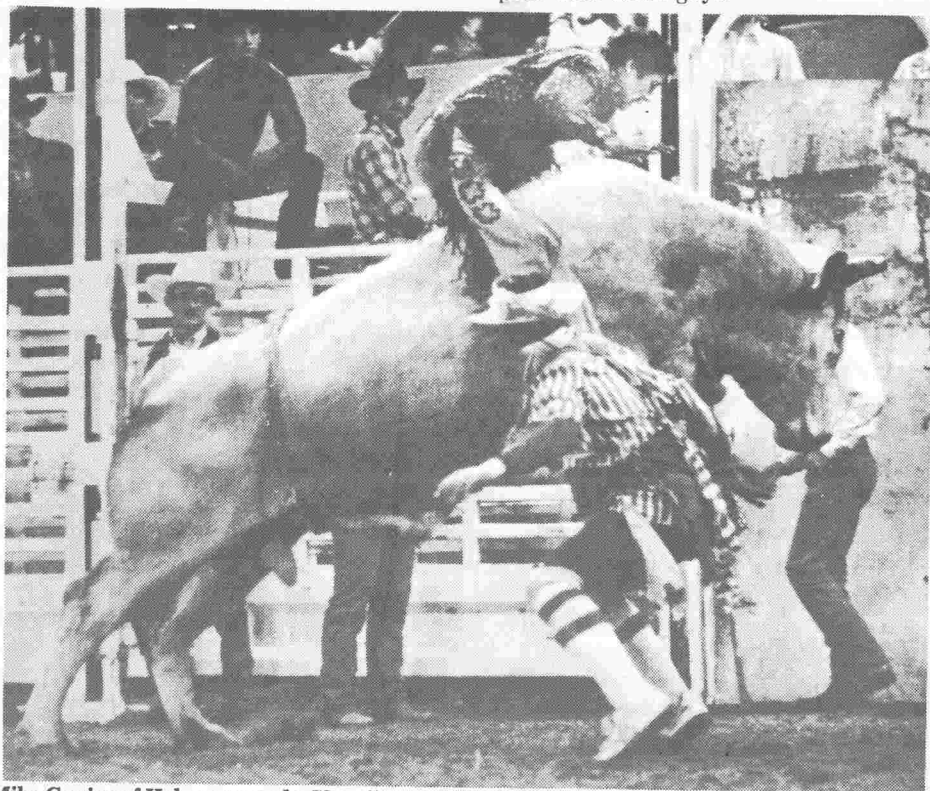
Rooster Reynolds stepped out of the shadows Thursday night but it happened so quick, a few people might have missed it.

The Twin Bridges cowboy capped the final performance of the Yellowstone Exhibition rodeo at the Metra with a 4.0 second run in steer wrestling that erased the 4.21 Monday opening night run by Bob Clark of Geraldine.

"You just get so nervous, you can't seem to keep dry," Reynolds said while wiping his palms. "I haven't had many fours, I'm pretty happy. I set my goals in the Northern Rodeo Association. It's hard to follow in the footsteps of my dad but I set my goals and things are clicking."

Reynolds' father, Benny, was the 1961 world champion all-around cowboy and is arguably the best hand on the Old Timers circuit today.

"Myself, I want to do good in the NRA," Reynolds said. "I'd like to go pro and I probably will, but not until I prove I can compete with these guys."

BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING

AUGUST 15, 1985 – ZONTA ROOM, YELLOWSTONE METRA, BILLINGS, MONT.

President Glen Hough called the meeting to order. Roll was called. Those directors present included: GLEN HOUGH, BUTCH BRATSKY, JANN JOHNSON, ED WALDHAUSER, BUZZ COPE, BUTCH REYNOLDS, BILL STOVALL, JOE SMITH, COLIN MURNION, SKEETER NORDAHL, DR. HOWARD HOLLOWAY, JANET ENDECOTT, BOB GRAVELLY, BILL LYNN, VIVIAN MEFFORD, LISA SCHEFFER, BILL DAVIS, TOM HOLLAND, LOIS HILL, ED MILLER, BOB SCHALL. Those events not represented included the calf roping, breakaway roping and stock contractors. A quorum was present.

The minutes of the April 6 Board of Directors meeting were distributed. Additions/corrections were called for. Approved as written.

The current finances were discussed. Financial report was read and accepted subject to audit.

Committee reports were called for. The judging committee (BB, SB, and BR directors) held a judging clinic Tuesday, Aug. 13. As per the ruling effective April 6, all judges must attend a judging seminar before being approved for 1986. There were 10 to 15 people in attendance.

Old Business was called for. None.

New Business:

PROTESTED FINES —

1. Ken Hendrix/Mike Doud turnout, Townsend 1984. Re: wife due to have baby. Discussion. Butch Bratsky moved: HENDRIX/DOUD BE ASSESSED BOTH THEIR FINES AND FEES. Bill Lynn, second. Passed

2. Lee Perrin/Chris Evertz turnout East Helena 1985. Re: death in family day before their competition. Discussion. Bob Schall moved: PERRIN/EVERTZ FEES AND FINE MONIES BE RETURNED TO THEM. Butch Bratsky, second. Passed.

3. Robinson/Kosoff/Kosoff turnout, Polson 1985. Re: auto accident en route to rodeos. Discussion. Because of the efforts made by the cowboys in contacting all rodeo personnel involved, Butch Bratsky moved: FINE MONIES WILL BE REFUNDED TO ROBINSON/KOSOFF/KOSOFF AND ONLY THE FEES WILL BE COLLECTED. Vivian Mefford, second. Passed.

4. Bryan Anderson/Val Christensen/Vic McGinley/Kelly Munsee \$100 central entry bond protest, Shelby 1985. Both call back and entry tapes for these contestants were played back to the Board. Discussion. Bob Schall moved: THE BONDS POSTED BY THE CONTESTANTS BE REFUNDED AND ANDERSON'S THIRD PLACE PAYOFF CHECK BE PAID OUT. Vivian Mefford, second. Passed.

5. Bill Workman turnout Kalispell 1985. Due to the cancellation of a performance, the contestant was turned out as he did not call back. Discussion. The board felt that the contestant was at fault since no call back had been made. Workman's point on late cancellation of performances was noted by the board.

6. Bob Schall non-payment fees Shelby 1985. Schall's protest letter was read to the Board. Discussion regarding circumstances at the Shelby rodeo. Butch Bratsky moved: SCHALL'S FEES WERE INCLUDED IN THE PAYOFF AS WERE MIKE/CINDE/JOHN BARTHELMESS', AND SPIKE GUARDIPEE'S, AND THEIR FINE MONIES ARE TO BE REFUNDED TO THEM. Tom Holland, second. Passed.

TURN-OUTS/SUSPENDED LIST

Jim Bushnell: we need to work with those people on the suspended list and get them back in good standing with the Association. Bill Davis moved: THE NRA DRAW UP A CONTRACT WITH THESE PEOPLE WHO WISH TO REGAIN GOOD STANDING IN THE ASSOCIATION, COLLECT THE ACTUAL FEE OR BAD CHECK AMOUNT AND CURRENT MEMBERSHIP CARD AMOUNT (ACTUAL COSTS INCURRED TO THE NRA PLUS "C" (CASH ONLY) MEMBERSHIP CARD), HAVE THE CONTRACT CO-SIGNED BY A MEMBER IN GOOD STANDING, AND ALLOW 60 DAYS FOR THE SUSPENDED PARTY INVOLVED TO PAY THE FINE AMOUNT LEFT OWING. IF, AFTER 60 DAYS MONEY IS

LEFT OWING, BOTH PARTIES INVOLVED (PREVIOUSLY SUSPENDED MEMBER AND MEMBER IN GOOD STANDING WHO CO-SIGNED) WILL BE PLACED ON THE SUSPENDED LIST FOR DOUBLE THE AMOUNT REMAINING. Lois Hill, second. Passed.

PERMITS

The NRA permit system was addressed. Changes could be made to possibly add additional membership to the Association. Bill Davis moved: A CONTESTANT MAY PURCHASE A PERMIT TO COMPETE AT ALL RODEOS WHICH ACCEPT PERMITS UNTIL \$500 IS WON. THE PERMIT HOLDER'S POINTS WILL COUNT TOWARD YEAR-END STANDINGS. AFTER THE \$500 PERMIT LIMIT IS REACHED, A CARD MUST BE PURCHASED. PRICE OF CARD TO BE THE DOLLAR DIFFERENCE BETWEEN THE COST OF A PERMIT AND THE COST OF A CARD. HOWEVER, THE CONTESTANT MUST BE A CARD HOLDER TO COMPETE AT THE FINALS RODEO. THE \$500 MONEY LIMIT WILL BE ACCUMULATED FROM YEAR TO YEAR, ALLOWING THE CONTESTANT TO PURCHASE A PERMIT EACH YEAR UNTIL THE \$500 IS WON. Joe Smith, second. PASSED. (Note: a card holder one year will still be ineligible to purchase a permit the FOLLOWING year.)

Discussion resumed regarding additional membership to the Association. Bob Schall suggested that cards be made available at a reduced rate to all National High School Rodeo Association members. ED MILLER MOVED (BOB SCHALL'S IDEA): ANY CURRENT NATIONAL HIGH SCHOOL RODEO ASSOCIATION MEMBER IN GOOD STANDING CAN PURCHASE A CURRENT NRA MEMBERSHIP AT 1/2 REGULAR CARD PRICE. Joe Smith, second. Passed.

Electric eye refunds in the barrel racing event were addressed. Discussion. Vivian Mefford moved: \$2 BE COLLECTED FROM EVERY BARREL RACING CONTESTANT AT EACH RODEO FOR THE ELECTRIC EYE. IF THE ELECTRIC EYE FAILS TO WORK AND HAND TIMES ARE USED, THE \$2 IS TO GO INTO AN ELECTRIC EYE REPAIR FUND, TO BE USED TOWARDS REPLACEMENT OR REPAIR OF THE ELECTRIC EYES. Lisa Scheffer, second. Passed.

The NRA has for many years been a supporter of the Montana Barrel Racers Association through the purchase of a trailer ad. Discussion. Lois Hill moved: THE NRA PURCHASE A 1985 MBRA TRAILER AD FOR \$100. Bill Stovall, second. Passed.

Regarding the suspension of local contestants: as stated in the rule book, permit holders and local contestants' fees must be paid PRIOR to call back time.

The fine amount for bad checks was addressed, currently at \$10 or 10%, whichever is greater. Bill Davis moved: THE FINE ON BAD CHECKS RECEIVED BY THE NRA OFFICE BE INCREASED TO \$50 PER NON-CLEARING CHECK. Tom Holland, second. Passed.

Discussion concerning the definition of "local" when referring to local contestants. Discussion. A contestant may enter ONE rodeo ONLY as a local contestant per year. Definition of LOCAL to be left up to each individual committee.

The idea of a mini-convention among our committees, stock contractors, media personnel, directors, was addressed. Discussion. Bill Davis moved: A MINI-CONVENTION WILL BE HELD, WITH LOIS HILL AS CHAIRMAN. LOIS MAY SELECT HER COMMITTEE TO ASSIST HER. Tom Holland, second. Passed.

The Rocky Mountain Association of Fairs Convention to be held Nov. 14-16 in Boise, Idaho was discussed. Tom Holland moved: THE NRA SEND A DELEGATION TO ATTEND THE RMAF CONVENTION. Bob Schall, second. Passed.

The suggestion has been made that the NRA issue "GOLD CARDS" to those members who have been long-time card holders. Tabled until fall meeting.

Discussion concerning the handling of NOTIFIED TURN-OUTS. Ed Miller moved: A COMMITTEE BE FORMED TO WORK OUT A FAIR PROCEDURE TO HANDLE NOTIFIED TURN-OUTS, FEES AND THE FINING OF CONTESTANTS. Bob Schall, second. PASSED. Committee: Bob Schall, Jann Johnson, Jim Bushnell, Glen Hough.

There was a problem at the Townsend rodeo concerning "notified turn-outs." Bob Schall moved: THE CONTESTANT WHO HAD PAID HIS FEES, DANNY CROSS, (FEES WERE

INCLUDED IN THE PAYOFF) WILL NOT BE ASSESSED A FINE. THOSE CONTESTANTS WHO HAD NOT PAID THEIR FEES, RICHARD CARPENTER AND RICK TRYAN, WILL BE ASSESSED THE TOTAL FEES AND 1/2 THE FEES AS A FINE. Joe Smith, second. Passed.

Discussion regarding the payoff at two go/same day rodeos was addressed. EFFECTIVE IMMEDIATELY. Joe Smith, second. Passed. (ex.: 9 contestants x \$70 fees = \$630 + \$150 added money = \$780 x 3% = \$23.40. \$780 - \$23.40 = \$756.60 ÷ 3 = \$252.20 per go/ave. Use 40/30/20/10 payoff)

It was brought to the board's attention that the NRA has been slack in the fining of stock contractors over rule infractions. Procedures to be discussed at winter meetings.

Ed Miller moved: The NRA donate \$250 cash to the Arlene Hauqland benefit fund and donate ad space in the NRA News for the benefit. Skeeter Nordahl, second. Passed.

Day money was discussed. The Team Roping director, Bill Lynn, to bring back to the board recommendations at the February meeting.

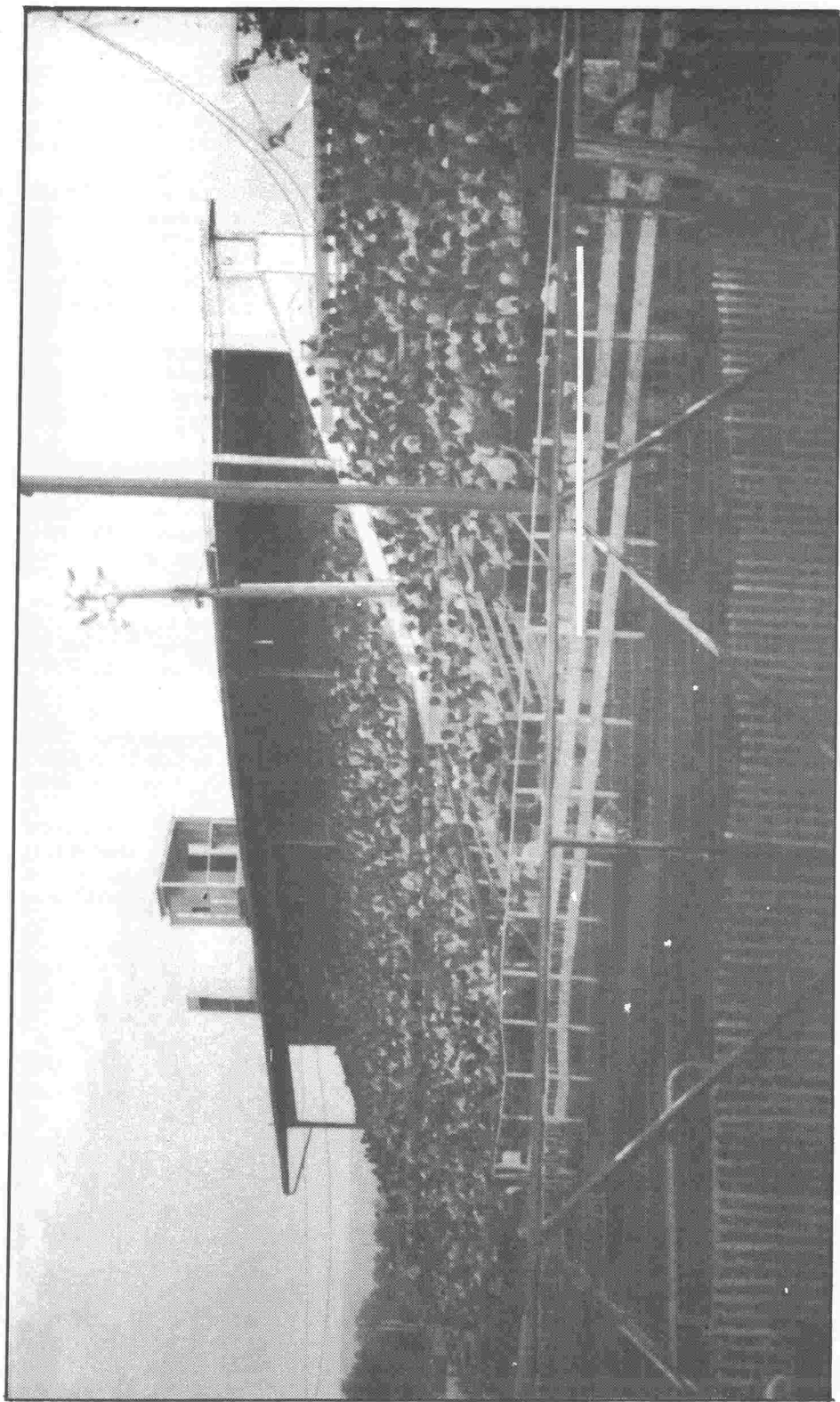
There have been complaints by the contestants regarding their payoff checks. They feel they are not receiving them quick enough from the rodeos, and that the day money checks at the Yellowstone Exhibition should be paid out after each performance. Both problems will be addressed.

Small Rider Makes Big Scores

Dan Mortensen doesn't look like your average bull riding champion.

The 5-5, 100-pound, two-time Montana state high school bull riding champion moves off the dirt and onto the mat five months of the year for the Billings Senior High School wrestling team.

But this week, the 16-year-old junior is making a second appearance in the National High School Rodeo that begins Monday in Rapid City, S.D.

Mortensen doesn't consider his size to be an advantage or disadvantage in bull riding. "I don't think it matters. You're pulling your own weight no matter what your size. It's harder for a big guy to ride."

The wrestling-rodeo combination keeps him in shape from November until August. "I didn't even have to diet that much for wrestling," said the varsity 98-pounder.

Mortensen won the state bull riding title as a freshman in 1984. "I wasn't even considered to make it to nationals," he said. "But I got real lucky."

After being bucked off his first bull in the nationals, he rode his second to ninth place in the go-around and finished 32nd overall standings.

Improvement will be his challenge this year. "There's about 160 in the bull riding alone."

Mortensen doesn't limit his rodeoing to the high school circuit. His state high school championship qualified him for a membership in the Northern Rodeo Association.

"Last year I only got to ride one bull. I wanted to hit more of the youth shows. I didn't think I could do that well in the NRA," he confessed.

This season he has traveled Montana far and wide, collecting \$532.29, moving him into the 10th spot in the NRA bull riding standings.

He managed a trip to Roundup the day before the state high school finals, finished first in the average and the go-arounds, for a \$475 payoff.

"I'd just like to make it to the finals (NRA) this year."

Mortensen had to talk his father into letting him ride the bulls. Donald Mortensen was an NRA rider until he was gored by a bull in the late 60's. "He had four kids when he got gored and thought he'd better get off," said the son. "He got hurt and didn't want me to."

Fortunately the young man has suffered only minor injuries from the animals he's

ridden and doesn't discourage easily. "If you really want to (ride), you will."

Dan's rodeo career began at 10 when a friend that rodeoed started him with a horse in some of the timed events.

Practice isn't limited to rodeo stock for the teenager and his friends. He uses Dale Small's practice stock, but on occasion has tried out range bulls. "We like to try and see which ones buck the best. We tried to train one. In a rodeo, the clown will grab an ear to make him turn. It didn't work."

There is additional danger when riding range stock. "They're not used to the chutes. We take them over to an arena and they like to jump up in the chute. They could fall over on top of you"

Mortensen will face unknown stock in Rapid City this week. The Sutton Rodeo Company stock last appeared in June at the College National Finals Rodeo in Bozeman. The draw could be all-important to the outcome in the nationals.

In the state finals, Mortensen topped the first go-round with a 77 on Crackerback. "I might have got a little big gifted. I got on the only bull that spun, other than Denny Wells' (Forsyth) and his didn't come around that good."

On the second day, only one rider, Craig Miller, completed his ride for a 67. Mortensen's 77 held up for the average and his second state title.

If Mortensen rides his way into national prominence in South Dakota this week, it may not mean instant recognition at his high school.

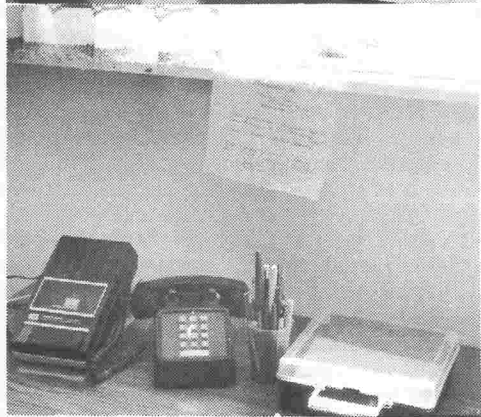

The Montana Travel Promotion bureau likes to give tourists rodeo information for their summertime stay in Montana, but it is necessary to have this information early to be included in all the brochures.

Also, the NRA has run into problems previously in having many rodeos scheduled one weekend, and none other weekends, so it is hoped that the mini-convention will get the committees together to schedule their rodeos, to everyone's best advantage.

Even though Oct. 5 and 6 seems a little too early for this type of gathering, NRA officers and directors have found that it is never too early to start planning and also "you can't spell profit without P.R."

The permit system has been revised to enable a \$35 permit holder to compete in an unlimited number of NRA approved rodeos until he or she has won \$500.

Members in good standing of the National High School Rodeo Association can join the NRA at 1/2 price beginning in 1986.

The NRA will make a concerted effort to work out contracts with those persons on the suspended list wishing to regain good standing in the association.

The board authorized a mini-convention to be held. See article elsewhere in this issue.

Much of the duration of the meeting centered around protesting of fines and took up considerable time and discussion, including listening to the Central Entry taped conversations. Concensus of opinion pointed to fining others than the cowboys who break the rules.

Crow's Nests – A Variety of Styles

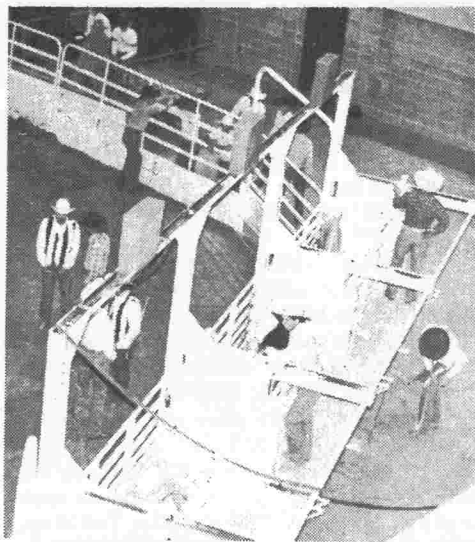
The "From the Crow's Nest" moniker which has been attached to the "from the editors" column in this publication for many years evolved from the position your editors take at each rodeo at which they are present. Stan, as an announcer and Tootie, as a timer, may see rodeo in a different light from that seen by fans and contestants.

That sometimes precarious perch above the various arenas across Montana comes in a number of styles of architecture, and obviously most were not designed by persons familiar with what goes on in an announcer's stand — or the "crow's nest."

None are perfect, but some are much better than others, and several should have been condemned by the local public health officials years ago.

The classic announcer's stand has to be the flatbed trailer positioned next to the fence at the arena at Gardiner before their announcer's stand was constructed. Half the audience was at our back along with the busy beer stand, and often we had folks half full of beer or tourists with cameras join us on the trailer for a closer look. Kibitzers threw in their two-bits occasionally, and one time we had a lady from the Netherlands speak to us in her native tongue. Luckily we had with us our Dutch foreign exchange student to interpret. Come to find out she liked Stan's Chris Le Doux tape and wanted to know where she could get one. The top rail of the fence was at eye level from our spot on the trailer, so in order to keep an eye on the flag at the calf chute or the bronc chutes, one either had to stand on tip toe or slouch down to see. The flatbed trailer offered no protection from the elements whatsoever, and Tootie's famous red umbrella came in handy, but holding an umbrella, a watch, and writing times down proved difficult if not impossible.

Harlowton recently replaced their announcer's stand, because their old one was in a state of near collapse. Originally it appeared as if they had borrowed old telephone poles on which to construct it, for it waved nearly as high as the flag. The front was completely open, giving officials a good view of what was happening in the arena, protected from falling out by only a 2 x 4 and a section of yard fencing. There was a park bench to sit one (no time to sit, of course) but no plank or desk to write on. But that was o.k. because when it rained, the west wind soaked everything and everybody anyway. All that could be overlooked, however, because the telephone poles holding the whole contraption up, tipped back over the years, and the last year of its existence, tipped

precariously at nearly a 45 degree angle. Stock being loaded into the chutes shook it even more, and we feared for our safety when the bulls were loaded.

The replacement they built is considerably sturdier.

Ronan has a real dandy. Sturdy but extra high and small. An announcer and two timers is about all it will hold, and one year when the committee brought a three-person group to sing the national anthem, the timers had to get up on the counter to make room. But they are used to that because the front of the stand is so high, they have to crawl up on the counter to see out, and then hang over precipitously to get a good view of the bronc chutes.

Having a small announcer's stand is not all bad, however. Lewistown's is nice size but offers enough room that a number of people can crowd in up there to get a good view of the rodeo, and in the meantime make pests of themselves. Committee people, those ever-important folks who make the rodeo possible, probably think the rodeo officials are pretty grouchy as they ask them to "shush" or even leave.

Absarokee has enough room in theirs that a table can be set up - to have a picnic.

The view from most announcer's stands is great to see the rodeo, but not always great for the timers to see the rough stock chutes or the timed event chutes, for some timers need x-ray vision or telescopes. Even the best arena in the state, the METRA in Billings, doesn't offer the timers the best view to do a good job.

Crow's Nests . . .

And of course besides all the natural barriers, there are always numerous cowboys or little kids standing in the way of the flag or the front of the rough stock chutes.

There are few announcer's stands that aren't naturally air-conditioned, in both hot weather and cold. Many committees through the years have installed windows to be slid or lowered shut to protect the rodeo personnel from the cold or wind. And such is the case in Malta's Milk River Pavilion, where the timers and announcers are protected from north Montana's "cool" winters by permanent and sliding glass windows. The announcer's stand is right on the ceiling giving everyone a good view. It's a wonderful setup until summer comes. When the temperature outside shot up to 107 degrees this summer, it was 115 degrees in the announcer's stand. No breeze, either.

More interesting, perhaps, than the announcer's stands, is the route and method one must take to get to them. Most have ladders, some with rungs missing, and some have steep stairs, all of which makes climbing up with briefcases and books challenging. One must follow a circuitous route through the unsaddling chute, through a catch pen perhaps, over several fences, and then behind the bucking chutes where cowboys can be found in various states of undress, getting ready for the bareback riding.

Red Lodge's arena, "Home of Champions," should offer a champion trophy buckle to each

timer and announcer who accepts the challenge of climbing up into their announcer's stand. Admittedly, the arena is great for fans with seating, completely around it, but in order to get into the crow's nest, you must first climb the stairs behind the bleachers, wind through the seats, climb a ladder (with one handrail) which takes you high above the crowd in the bleachers, to a catwalk. The catwalk has one handrail, is open on the other side, and looking down you can see the crowd 20 feet below. After a breathless trip across the catwalk, you finally reach the safety of the announcer's stand.

The "innards" of rodeo, the part that the paying customer never sees, plays a vital role in rodeo's smooth-running. Perhaps a view "from the crow's nest" would aid in their improvement.

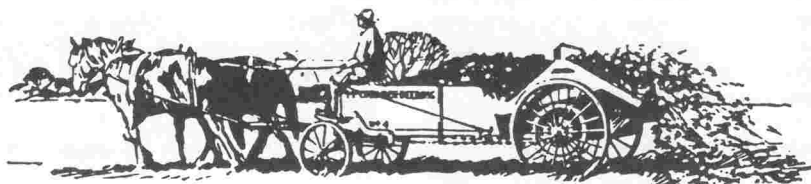

Horse of Year - Hermies Worm

Mr. Joe Sass 682,366, sorrel gelding foaled May 22, 1969. His sire is Joe Jimmy's Bar by Joe Jimmy 9888; his dam, Clegg's Wonder by My King Clegg 60797. The foundation sire numbers on his grandsires indicate why he is a well built and muscled gelding. You may know him better by his professional working name "Hermies Worm."

Hermie was voted by the cowboys of the Northern Rodeo Association, to be the Bareback Bucking Horse Of The Year, as well as well as bareback horse of the finals in 1984.

Efforts to locate the persons who bred and owned Hermie as a foal in Highmore, S.D. were unsuccessful. However, a man in Hyannis, Neb. who owned him as a five-year-old was located. This gentleman is a steer wrestler and said he would sure enough buck you off in the spring when you first started to use him for the summer. You also had to keep him well ridden down to keep getting along with him.

He said he had used him at the Cheyenne Frontier Days Rodeo in Cheyenne, Wyo. in the steer wrestling event.

Rocky Mountain Rodeo Co. first came in contact with Hermie when he was sold to them by a North Dakota horse dealer. This dealer demonstrated how he could turn on a dime, slide to a stop and represented him as being a champion steer "roping" horse, but Hermie's talent of bucking wasn't discussed.

When Hermie ended up in the team roping practice pen, is the first time we came in contact with his hidden talent. Richard Carpenter tried to head a steer when Hermie let it fire. Hermie didn't quite get his head and Richard didn't quite leave the saddle. On the second steer Hermie was more prepared. The bucking was a little stronger and the ride was a little harder. That day more or less ended Hermie's team roping days.

A friend from Canada suggested that all Hermie needed was a lot of long hard miles with wet saddle blankets hanging in the barn at night. He wanted to show Hermie Canada!

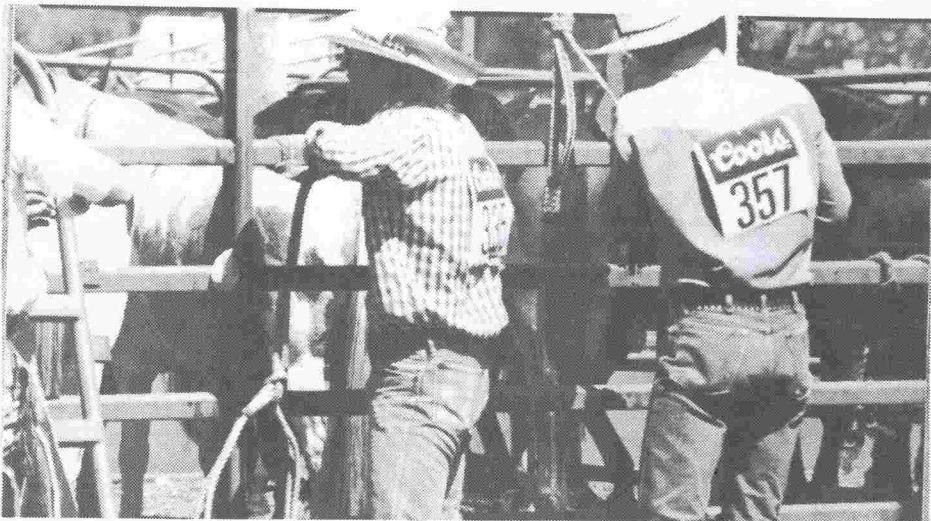

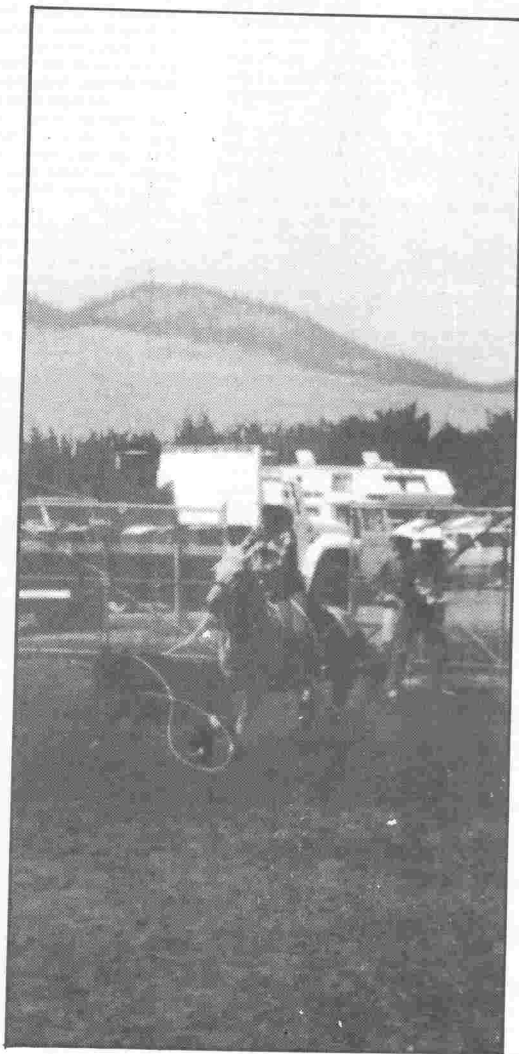

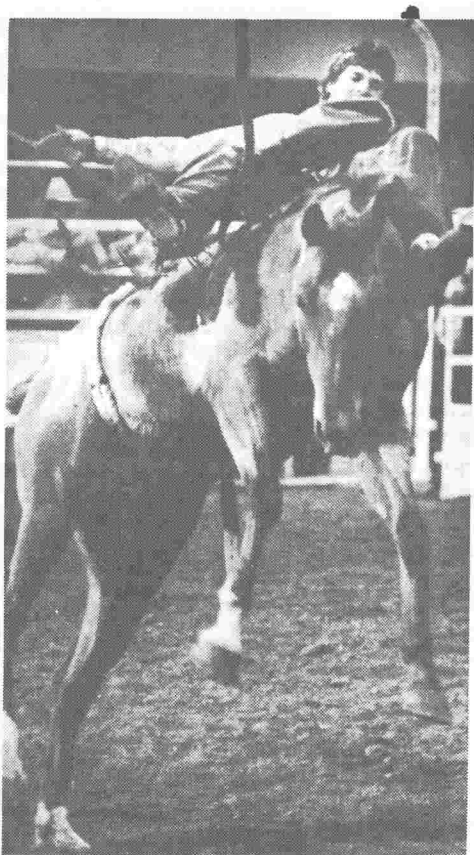

The omniverous indifference of a cowboy's all you need.

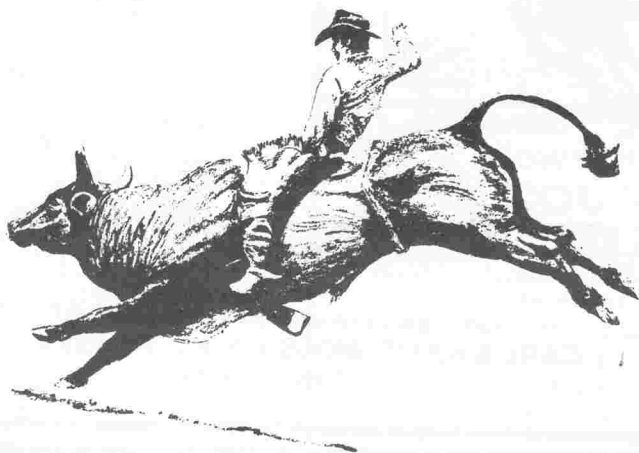
He's in tune with Mother Nature and can live off of the land

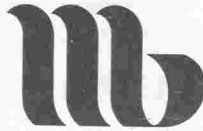

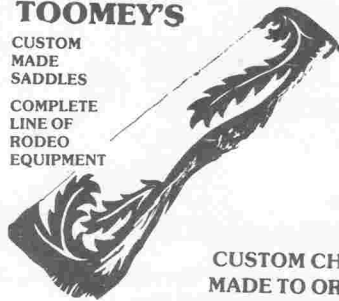
